OVERVIEW

Preparation and installation of art galleries and public programs for exceptional experiences.

Primary Responsibilities:

The following responsibilities describe the general nature of work for employees in this position, but this is not intended as an exclusive or all-inclusive inventory.

- Participate in art installation and de-installation by proper handling, lifting, moving, placing, and hanging works of art as required by the IMA art handling guidelines. Also assist uncrating and crating works of art when necessary.
- Prepare galleries for exhibition installations, including patching and painting gallery walls, locating and moving gallery furnishings, and implementing designs for temporary exhibitions.
- Maintain and refurbish gallery installations, including patching and painting walls and exhibition furnishings for permanent collection.
- Deliver, install, de-install, and collect works of art by truck, both locally and interstate.
- Communicate with curatorial, conservation, and registration staff to gather information, e.g., for art moves, art conservation problems, approvals for art moves.
- Work within the installation crew with appreciation of the team and its mission.
- Handle miscellaneous exhibition duties, including maintenance of storage, hanging carts, and collecting supplies and materials for art installations.
- Install and de-install electronic media devices including but not limited to DVD players, projectors, displays, touchscreens, computers, media players, and their components for use in temporary exhibitions and permanent collections.
- Maintain operation and schedules of electronic devices used in exhibition installations and interactive activities.
- Work with gallery designers, conservators, artists, and curators for the optimal use of electronic media.
- Maintain inventories of electronic devices and components.
- Train other crew members in the function and control of electronic devices.
- Participate in "on call" schedule for troubleshooting of electronic art in the galleries.

Required Skills:

- Knowledge of woodworking and finish construction and the ability to use hand and power tools and hardware along with good manual dexterity.
- Knowledge of art and art handling, including installation skills.
- Wall painting skills.
- Organizational skills.
- Ability to read, write and comprehend instructions, correspondence, and memos.
- Ability to effectively present information in one-on-one and group situations to other employees.
- Ability to calculate figures and amounts for design layouts of exhibitions and proportions. Algebra helpful.
- Ability to apply common sense understanding to carry out instructions furnished in written, oral, or diagram form.
- Ability to deal with problems involving several concrete variables in standardized situations.

Education and/or Experience:

Professional level of knowledge needed in specialized field, equivalent to that which
would be acquired by completing a four year college program and one to two years job
related experience, or equivalent combination of education and experience.
