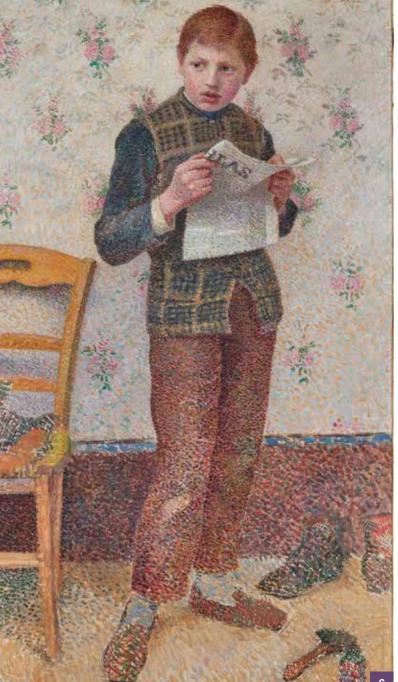

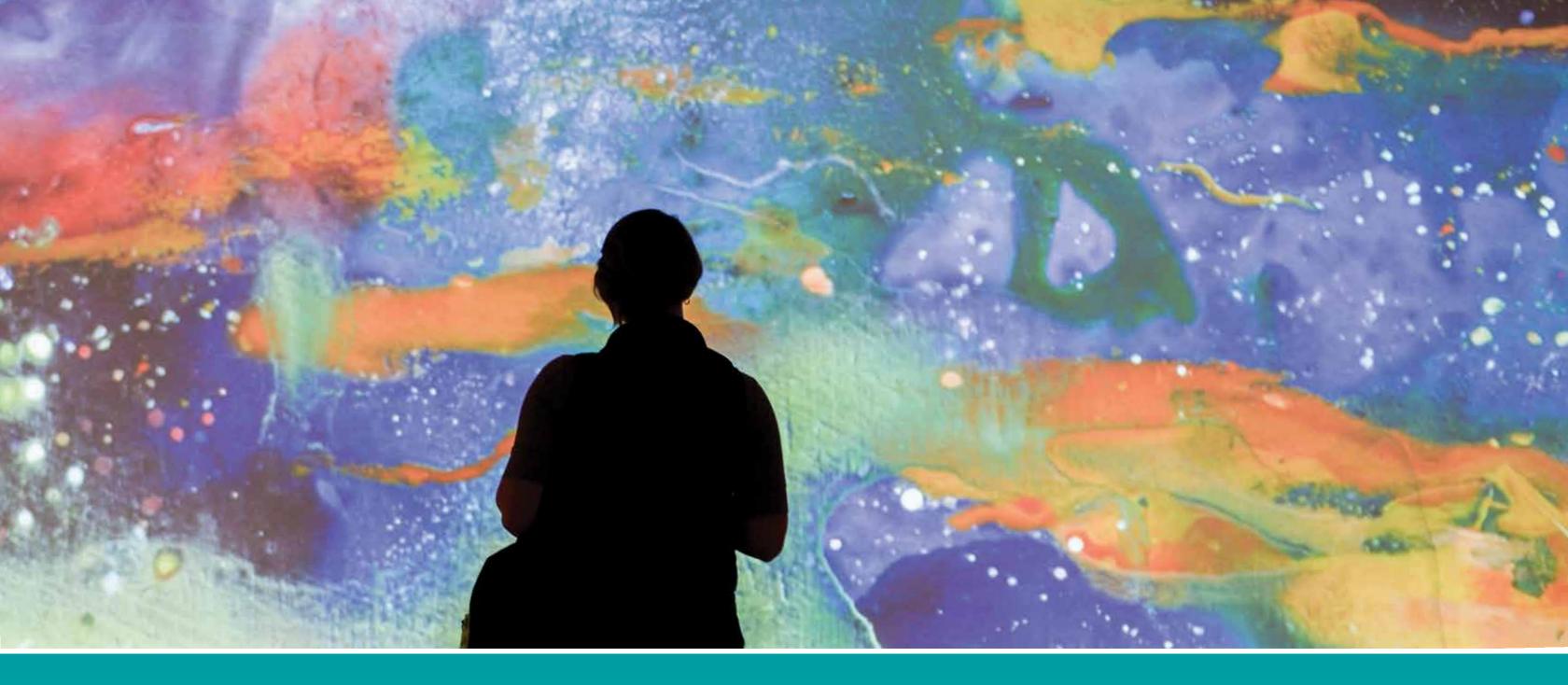

FROM THE CHAIR What an extraordinary year it has been! • As the preceding pages highlight, our programs, acquisitions, exhibitions and community outreach continue to strengthen the IMA's position as a leading art museum. • The IMA could not have achieved this distinction, however, without the dedication of its staff and volunteers.

Last year, volunteers donated approximately 40,000 hours of their time to the institution. And the IMA's staff conceived and mounted innovative programs and exhibits that attracted more than 258,000 visitors. As a consequence, the IMA is vibrant and strong. For their commitment and dedication, I would like to thank our members. staff, and volunteers for their many contributions to the IMA this past year. • As you are aware, last year we adopted a new general admission policy for the Museum and Gardens. The change was motivated by our desire to place the IMA on a more secure and viable long-term financial path—one which reduces our unsustainable reliance on endowment income and generates

more revenue from other sources. We couldn't be more pleased with the outcome of this decision. For fiscal year 2015–2016, membership increased 30% over the prior year. The IMA now has the highest number of members in its history: almost 16,000.

The IMA is also benefiting from continued restraint on expenses; budgeted expenditures are 12% under where they were last year, and total expenses are expected to be under budget more than \$1,500,000.

The IMA continues to monitor its financial situation carefully. As Dr. Venable outlines in his letter, the institution's Board and leadership team are currently evaluating additional steps to increase earned revenue in line with its mission, while preserving the quality of the IMA's artistic and natural assets.

The IMA has a significant endowment. However, about onethird of the value of the endowment is offset by debt incurred during the last expansion. At the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016, the IMA's operating endowment was valued at approximately \$343,280,000. The annual draw on the endowment during fiscal 2016 was a blended rate of 5.49%, an improvement from the 5.99% from the previous fiscal year. In accordance with best investment management practices adopted by many institutions, the IMA remains committed to decrease the annual draw on its endowment to a target of 5.0% in order to ensure the sustainability of the endowment over time.

Recently, the IMA Board of Governors approved to pay down \$17.7 million of outstanding debt to bring total indebtedness under \$100 million for the first time in many years. This step, part of the IMA's 10-year debt repayment plan, will help contribute to its long-term financial stability.

As I mentioned in my remarks at the Annual Meeting in May, it is our collective appreciation of beauty that binds together those of us who care deeply about this institution. As we look ahead, let us remember that it is our love of art and nature in all forms that enriches our lives and compels us to dream and work collaboratively in this great creative enterprise that is the Indianapolis Museum of Art.

It is a sincere pleasure to work with Dr. Charles Venable and the talented team that leads the IMA. Continuity in leadership is critically important to achieving our long-term goals, and I am thrilled that the Board has extended Dr. Venable's contract for another 10 years.

I am confident the IMA will continue to inspire, celebrate, nurture, and sustain all of us for years to come.

The IMA is thriving. • It has welcomed and delighted visitors for a century and a third—a remarkable achievement for any

institution—and we are excitedly planning and thinking about

how we can continue to ensure its role as a central institution

in our community for another century. • Looking back at

fiscal year 2015–2016, we took a number of

decisive steps to fulfill our mission. Consider

these accomplishments:

- We mounted 19 exhibitions and acquired more than 300 works of art. Perhaps our most important acquisition was Alfredo Jaar's evocative Park of the Laments, first commissioned in 2010, but only recently acquired by the IMA.
- We also brought the IMA to the world through publications and generous loans of art. For example, Marty Krause, IMA curator of prints, drawings, and photographs, produced The Autobiography of Gustave Baumann. Dr. Tricia Y. Paik, curator of contemporary art, wrote Ellsworth Kelly, a definitive survey of the artist's work, which appeared shortly before Kelly's death late last year.
- We continued to exchange numerous works of art with other museums nationally and internationally. For example, our Collections Committee has approved the loan of two exceptional works by the great French Old Master painter Valentin de Boulogne for a major retrospective at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City and the Louvre in Paris next spring.
- We undertook a thorough analysis of the IMA's finances, market, collections, and programs, as well as done a detailed analysis of how the residents of central Indiana spend their leisure time.

We have embarked on this intensive self-study because the IMA is at a crossroads, and we need to think carefully about its future trajectory. Numerous studies of museums, historic homes, and performing arts organizations across the country have found that these institutions are facing change on an unprecedented scale as younger and more diverse audiences—no longer satisfied with passive, traditional engagements with art and culture-are spending their time elsewhere.

In a world where time is often more precious than money, providing exceptional experiences that attract more visitors with greater frequency is the key to the IMA's continued relevance and growth.

To do that, we have taken an in-depth look at what the IMA offers, and are developing new programs for these audiences of the future. With significant support from the Lilly Endowment, this year the IMA has undertaken major studies encompassing:

- a market research study focusing on audience segmentation and branding;
- a complete analysis of the cost of each of the IMA's programs, as well as an analysis of how the IMA might generate more earned income in the future, based on the experiences of similar institutions in other markets:
- · a community engagement analysis;
- · a fundraising feasibility study; and
- a complete evaluation of all 55,000 pieces of art in the collection.

This research effort will culminate in a new master plan to guide the IMA through the coming decades. As we develop this new plan, we will engage our guests, partner with our community, and embrace our unique resources in never-before-seen ways. In addition to our enduring commitment to building on our fine collection of art, we envision an institution that:

- Inspires lifelong learning and wellness—as we now do through our St. Mary's Child Center at the IMA Preschool and may do in the future with a stronger emphasis on food programming and ultimately a farm-to-table initiative.
- Celebrates diversity and community—as we now do through our art and plant collections and will do by forging a broader array of community partnerships going forward.
- Nurtures creativity and innovation—as we now do through our ARTx programs and in the future will do with more groundbreaking, campus-wide experiences.

Art & Nature Park: 100 Acres and will do in the future by more
actively teaching our visitors about how they can personally make
a difference.

Financial Highlights

In the past year, a combination of efforts helped further reduce outstanding debt and the IMA's draw on the endowment while increasing earned revenues.

Thanks to last year's revision of the general admission policy and the visionary efforts of IMA curators and horticulturists, earned revenues were up 11%, and revenues from Museum memberships were up 28% over fiscal year 2015.

"We are on the road to financial stability," said CFO
Jerry Wise. "Paying down the principal on our debt is a
significant step in ensuring a sustainable future for the
IMA. Along with this, we have significantly reduced our
endowment draw and cut costs across the organization,
while continuing to deliver outstanding programming and
exhibitions, such as 19 Stars of Indiana Art and Mini Golf
at the IMA. We are improving not only financially, but also
qualitatively as an organization."

Under Venable's leadership, the IMA has also secured major gifts of both art and capital, including a recent \$10 million gift from the Lilly Endowment to establish an endowed Innovation Fund. The Innovation Fund enables the Museum to identify, research, and pilot innovative programs to drive attendance and revenue.

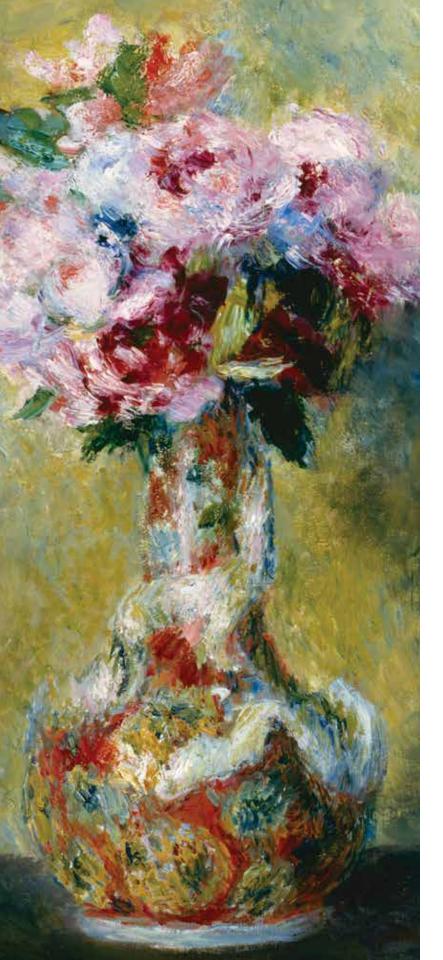

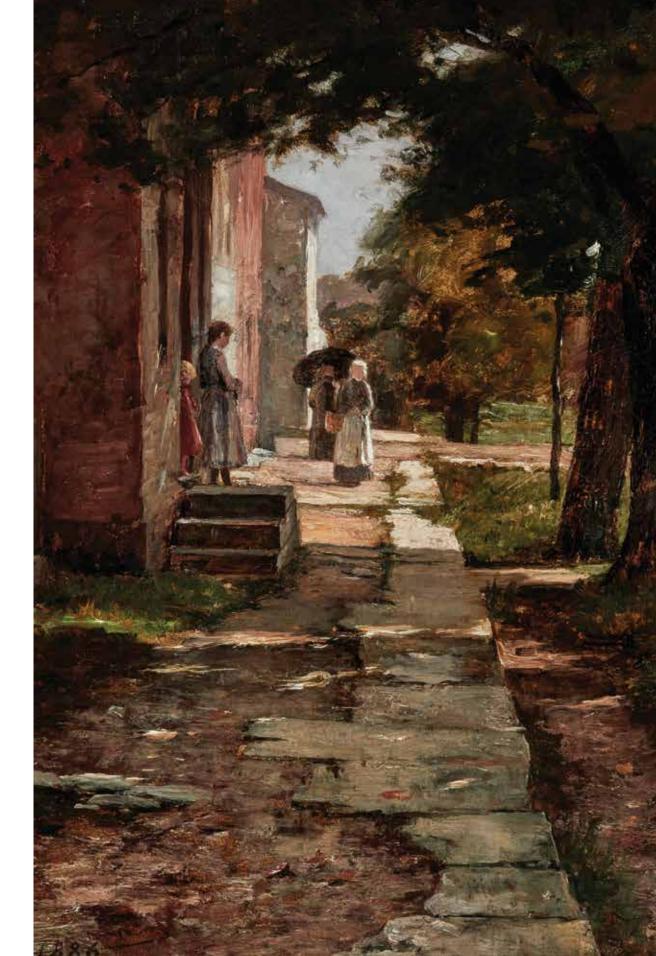
