Newly funded construction begins at Newfields this summer

Projects to support infrastructure, campus enhancements and connectivity

INDIANAPOLIS, June 25, 2019— This summer Newfields is beginning the construction of three major projects, including key infrastructure upgrades to help increase capacity and generate connectivity to Newfields. These projects are the first of many priority projects in the institution's 30-year masterplan, which was unveiled in late 2017.

"Newfields is committed to strategic, impactful and sustainable growth that benefits the Indianapolis community. With these key infrastructure improvements we will be able to welcome more people to Newfields and improve the quality of their experiences on our campus," said Dr. Charles L. Project: Parking Green Timeline: Ongoing—Fall 2019

Newfields is enhancing its ability to host and accommodate more visitors on peak days and events. The new Parking Green will consist of 200 new parking spaces by converting 78,000 sq. ft. of existing turf into reinforced turf, which allows for a safer and more sustainable way to park cars on grass without damaging the turf below. The Parking Green will be adjacent to Newfields' existing surface parking lot, located near the front entrance.

To make this reinforced turf, we are using a product called GEOBLOCK. GEOBLOCK is made from recycled plastic and lays flat underneath the grass to help distribute the weight of a vehicle. This weight distribution helps the grass grow back quicker and healthier. Once the construction is complete the Parking Green will be covered with a new layer of sod. When finished, the area product will continue to be a grass lawn and only used for parking during peak attendance periods.

This project will enable Newfields to implement additional large-scale seasonal festivals and exhibitions in response to the desires of today's arts and culture audiences. October 3-6, 2019, Newfields will debut its inaugural <u>Harvest</u> festival, a campus-wide art and nature experience.

Project: Multi-Use Path

Timeline: Late Summer-Fall 2019

With funding from the Department of Public Works and the Richard M. Fairbanks Foundation, Newfields can better connect its campus to community neighbors with the creation of a new multi-use path. The new path will begin at 42nd St. and continue all the way around Newfields perimeter, ending at the 38th St. entrance.

Key crosswalks at 42nd St., the Michigan Road entrance and the 38th St. entrance, will also be installed to allow guests to more safely cross these busy intersections. To also increase safety, the path will be wide enough for both cyclists and pedestrians.

Project: Pacers Bikeshare station

Timeline: Fall 2019

Newfields has partnered with the Indianapolis Cultural Trail Inc. to add a Pacers Bikeshare station to its campus, which is another way to increase neighborhood connectivity and mobility. This new Bikeshare station will be located on The Virginia B. Fairbanks Art and Nature Park: 100 Acres side of the Central Canal Towpath and is intended to increase multimodal transportation to and from the Fairbanks Park.
