### Some tips for searching

- Search for a specific object by using the artist's name, the title of the object, or its accession number, a unique number assigned to objects as they enter the collection and used to catalogue artwork. Accession numbers can be found on gallery labels and in credit lines.
- To find art objects that are on view in the same gallery, type the gallery number (ex. K212). Find gallery numbers on the campus guide.
- Find art objects of a similar type by entering the keyword as your search (ex. Portrait, Landscape, Seascape).
- Search for art objects that all have the same color by typing the name of the color (ex. red, blue, yellow, etc.).
- Search for art objects created by artists from a specific country by entering the artist's nationality as your search (ex. Dutch, Scottish, Ghanaian).
- **Enter the name of the donor** to see what objects came from the same source (the donor information can be found in the Credit Line information) (ex. try searching Mrs. James W. Fesler).
- Search results are interesting! **Try using a descriptive word** Can you figure out why the artworks that appear in response to your search show up in this category? (ex. Party, Happy, Rain, Mystery)
- **Limit your search** by selecting boxes at the top to only display objects that have an image available to view (select 'has image') and/or are currently on display in our galleries (select 'on display').
- Refine your results by using the options displayed on the left side of your search result page.
- Want a closer look? Along the right side of the page, you will see a full-screen option as well as deep
  zoom functions a great way to see brushstrokes, fabric weaves, textures, colors, and also take a closer
  look at the artist's signature.
- If you find an image you like, be sure to scroll down the page and **view the 'You May Also Like' images** that we provide. Pick a new image from this selection and see where Collections Search takes you.


